Description

"Students will engage in the careful reading and critical analysis of imaginative literature. Through this close reading of selected texts, students should deepen their understanding of the ways writers use language to provide both meaning and pleasure for their readers. As they read, students should consider a work's structure, style, and themes as well as smaller-scale elements as the use of figurative language, imagery, symbolism, and tone" (College Board 2004).

Academic Honesty

Burlingame High School defines the following as cheating or academic dishonesty:

Missing/Late Assignments

All missed assignments can be submitted within two days of an excused absence. No missed assignments will be accepted if you are present but have not completed the work. If you have a planned absence, you are still responsible for the work missed. Should you be absent the day a major assignment is due, *you must email the completed assignment to me by the time our class meets*. Failure to do so will be the equivalent of not doing the assignment. All assignments are posted daily on School Loop (SL); if you are out, check SL and come to class having done the work. Not doing several key assignments last year resulted in one person not graduating and others not getting the grade needed to get into the college of their choice. True story. Sad story. *Their* story. Don't make it yours.

Attendance

Follow school policies. If you have excessive absences, your grade will reflect this; if you have excessive tardies, it will affect your standing in the class and your ability to attend such events as the prom and formal.
